Hobbies: Bodybuilding, Playing Basketball.

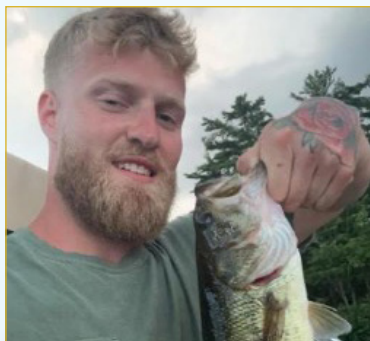
Favorite sports teams: Boston Celtics.

FUN FACTS FROM THE SEWER GUY

- After the implementation of the Federal Clean Water Act in 1972 and the associated wastewater system improvements, the number of waterways meeting water quality goals for fishing and swimming has roughly doubled.
- The U.S. Government Accountability Office estimates that water and wastewater utilities are not generating enough revenue from user rates to cover the full cost of their service. As a result, several utilities are starting to experience the effects of chronically postponed maintenance from funding shortfalls.
- In 2006, U.S. infrastructure was #6 on the World Economic Forum's ranking of best national infrastructure systems. By 2019, the ranking had fallen to #13.
- It has been estimated that more than \$180 billion is needed to repair or replace U.S. water, wastewater, and stormwater systems. Investing in water infrastructure generally produces healthier communities, reduces water pollution, and is estimated to directly generate nearly 1.9 million jobs. An additional 800,000 jobs will come from increased economic activity in related sectors.

Credit card or by e-check online, with a fee charged. (Fee is 2.75% of transaction amount with a \$1.95 minimum. Fee for e-check \$1) Please visit our website www.brunswicksewer.org for instructions.

Automatic deduction from your checking or savings account (No fee charged). Go to our website and select the "I Want To" tab then "Set Up Direct Payment". Complete the form and mail it to us at 10 Pine Tree Road, Brunswick, ME 04011 to complete the set up. **Do not send in paperwork as a form of payment for your current bill; we need to process the set up with the banking institution prior to the billing.**
